# "Barbie" Museum Final Project

**Objectives:** Students represent their understanding of Art History, Elements of Art, and Principles of Design by creating a diorama of an art museum that includes replica art pieces, such as paintings, as well as a Sculpture Garden that houses all of the 3-D art work. Students will include samples of art periods, art genres, and art that represents each of the Elements of Art and Principles of Design.

The following content is required to receive full credit (218 pts):

#### <u>A minimum of FOUR rooms (68 pts):</u>

1) Elements of Art Room (Element of Form will be placed in Sculpture Garden.)

- Includes a minimum of six images that represents each of the Elements of Art.
- Titles of elements and brief descriptions of each Element of Art. (1 pt each, 18 pts total)
- 2) Principles of Art Room
  - Includes at least one artwork that represents each of the Principles of Design.
  - Titles of principles and brief descriptions of each Principle of Design. (1 pt each, 14 pts total)
- 3) Art Periods Room
  - At least one artwork that represents each of the Art Periods.
  - Titles of art periods, dates, and brief descriptions of each Art Period (21 pts total)
  - One dedicated area (of your choice) highlighting an art genre (ie. Pop Art from Modern Art Period) with at least 5 images. (5 pts)

#### 4) Sculpture Garden

- Includes at least five forms that represents any the Elements of Art or Principles of Design.
- Titles of choice (element/principle/art period) and brief descriptions of each sculpture. (10 pts total)

ALL artwork must include the following (5 pts per artwork, 125 pts total):

- 1) Name of artist
- 2) Title of work
- 3) Year of work
- 4) Medium used
- 5) Art Period and Genre

Aesthetics (5 pts): See rubric on the back of this sheet.

#### Individual Research and Response (20 pts):

Choose one artwork from any Art Period and Genre. Type a one to two page report (double-spaced, 12 pt Arial or Georgia font) describing the artwork. Refer to the rubric on the back of this sheet. Response must include the following content:

- 5 pts Identify the elements of art and principles of design that were used to organize the composition of the artwork chosen. Why did you choose this artwork?
- 5 pts Who is the artist? What type of art does this artist do? Why did this artist create art?
- 5 pts How does the artwork reflect the ideas, images, and symbols from the culture within which it was made?
- 5 pts How did this artist's personal experiences influence this artwork? How does this artwork communicate a story, ideas, and emotions?
